Education Sector Strategic Plan Launched

A fter months of consultation with boards of education, senior leaders, Ministry of Education officials, students, teachers and support staff, the provincial Education Sector Strategic Plan was launched at the SSBA's Spring General Assembly.

The plan was approved by boards of education and accepted by the Ministry of Education, marking the first-ever strategic plan developed in partnership by Saskatchewan boards of education and the government.

"This is an opportunity to celebrate the shared leadership of boards of education with the Minister and senior Ministry leadership on this important and exciting undertaking in K-12 education," said SSBA President Janet Foord. "Boards of education are accountable for the outcomes of students in our schools and having input into the process for developing those desired outcomes and working towards common

goals will ensure we are working in partnership for the success of students."

In total, more than 1,000 staff members were consulted throughout the development of the ESSP. The plan's specific work objectives for 2014-15 focus on reading targets and developing a shared plan for First Nations and Métis education.

"The work and feedback provided

by senior leaders, professional and support staff cannot go unnoticed and we will continue to trust in their leadership as we work towards implementing this plan," said Foord. "In particular, thank you to all of our directors of education who were tireless in their pursuit of developing and finalizing this plan, which provides a blueprint for success in reaching desired outcomes in education."

Minister of Education Don Morgan, a former school board member, echoed Foord's sentiments in thanking all of the partners in education who were involved.

"Without your thoughtfulness, dedication, insight and participation, we could not have created this strategic plan — one that puts the needs of all Saskatchewan students at the forefront of the education system," said Morgan. "This is an exciting time for the education

'We Will Reach Our Ambitious Vision for Education'

sector and I look forward to moving ahead with all school boards on a unified approach to education in Saskatchewan."

The ESSP will guide the work of the sector from 2014-2020 with five long-term goals:

- By 2017, the increase in education operational spending will not exceed the general wage increases and inflationary costs within the sector, while being responsive to the challenges of student need, population growth and demographic changes;
- By June 2020, 80% of students will be at or above grade level in reading, writing and math;
- By June 2020, collaboration

between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal partners will result in significant improvement in First Nations and Métis achievement and graduations rates;

- Saskatchewan's graduation rate will reach 85% by 2020; and
- By June 2020, 90% of students exiting Kindergarten will score within the appropriate range in four of the five domains, as measured by the Early Years Evaluation.

One key message from Foord was that although the ESSP and the SSBA's Vision 2025 strategic plan reflect provincial priorities, boards of education will continue to be responsible for setting the direction at the school division level to support the unique needs of local

students, families and communities.

"In our Association plan, we envision an education system in Saskatchewan that others wish to emulate," said Foord. "If we continue to work in shared leadership, align the goals and outcomes for students, and put the sector plan into action we will realize our ambitious vision for education as well as meet the various targets we wish to achieve locally and provincially. There will continue to be challenges in the delivery of education, but we believe our continued and invigorated focus on ensuring students have the tools they need to succeed is a positive first step to success."

President's Address at Spring Assembly

A major focus of Foord's address was the Association's shared leadership with its education partners.

In this regard Foord spoke about the Joint Conference with SSBA, LEADS and SASBO that will take place in November 2014. This conference marks a "first" for these three education partners.

"Based on the theme "Navigating Our Future – Sharing the Vision", the conference will be an important celebration of education in Saskatchewan," explained Foord. "We are excited to be partners in this first ever education sector event."

Other events boards can look forward to are the CSBA Congress which is being held in Saskatoon and hosted by the SSBA in 2015. The 100th anniversary of the SSBA also occurs in 2015 and the Association has petitioned the Ministry to designate 2015 as the Year of the Trustee. Foord shared that boards can expect to see some memorable celebrations to honour this milestone.

The President's Address also touched on the importance of continued engagement with school boards, STF and the Ministry as work continues on provincial bargaining and locally determined terms and conditions for teachers.

Finally, Foord spoke about the Truth and Reconciliation (TRC) conversations that have occurred and will continue to unfold. The recommendations made by the TRC have been shared with boards and the Association is examining what processes other provinces have taken and what resources have been developed in response to the recommendations.

"There is good work being done across Saskatchewan by teachers who have integrated residential schools into their lesson plans. But this work is being done in pockets," Foord said. "So what's next? If we want to ensure this part of Canadian history is taught to all students in all schools, we need to hear from boards about the leadership role we will play in moving this important endeavour forward."

Boards Respond to Provincial Budget

Pollowing the release of the provincial budget in March, SSBA President Janet Foord said the Association was pleased with the priority placed on education as reflected in a 3.1 percent increase to operating funding. But she also told the media that the devil is often in the details. A post-budget survey was sent to board chairs, directors of education and chief financial officers which asked two questions:

 What are the greatest impacts of the provincial government's 2014-15 budget on your school division – positive, negative or both? What two key messages would you ideally like to see the SSBA raise with the Premier and Minister of Education?

Based on the responses and conversations with trustees at the SSBA's Spring Assembly, the following concerns and observations were shared with the Minister of Education:

- While the local impact of the budget varies from division to division, the new "Efficiency Factor" was the issue of concern raised most frequently by board members;
- Boards expressed concern over

- the fact that the new funding formula has not yet been completed with issues regarding transportation and locallydetermined terms and conditions still outstanding; and
- Transitional funding has been appreciated by boards who since 2009 have required and received it, but anxiety exists about the predictability of such funding going forward.

The Minister has arranged a meeting with President Foord to discuss these concerns. The outcome of these discussions will be shared with boards.

Small Schools, Big Programs in Prairie Valley

2013 Premier's Board of **Education Award for Innovation** and Excellence submission

 \mathbf{C} chool boards strive to attain Dequity in the delivery of all education programming regardless of school size or location. In order to effectively deliver programming often limited to larger centres, the Prairie Valley School Division

(PVSD) thought outside the box to offer programs relevant to students.

The Small Schools, Big Programs: Magnet Programming initiative at PVSD provides students with opportunities to take specialized programming that in the past their

community would not have been able to access.

"Our board is committed to ensuring all students have equitable learning opportunities and access to the programs that will help them to succeed," said Board Chair Janet Kotylak. "To do so, we must find innovative ways to offer programs to the rural students who otherwise wouldn't have the opportunity."

The challenge is to offer quality programs that are not only accessible but cost-effective and sustainable.

"We can provide quality education with limited programming, but we want quality education with equitable programming options," said Director of Education Ben Grebinski.

As a result of a program review, the magnet program concept was introduced in September 2010 with the purpose of enhancing course options for students in rural high schools. "Centres of Excellence" would be developed in different locations and students

from other schools would travel to each location to participate in the program.

As a result, administrators in the school division had to align school programming and schedules to ensure students from various schools could attend these specialized programs, such as welding, food sciences, outdoor education and construction. Currently there are 35 course offerings in the magnet program, some of which require distance learning technologies.

"Why don't we create sites of excellence or specialization in our communities and magnet these students to the facilities as

opposed to taking the facility to the students?" said Grebinski. "We completed interest surveys with students to find out what programs they were interested in, and then we looked at existing facilities and what we could do to enhance facilities. Yet we didn't want to create permanent labs because within a few years desires may change and you might be looking at robotics or other

technical programs."

The division looked at various facilities and what could be done to transport students within a "reasonable radius" of no more than 20 or 30 minutes on a bus per day between home location and the magnet schools, explained Grebinski.

The response from

students has been positive with high demand for the programming and successful student outcomes.

"Learning opportunities impact learning achievement. It's not just about raising the achievement bar; it's asking, 'How do I engage kids through opportunities that are appropriate?'" explained Grebinski. "What students want today is relevance. They want to take the curriculum that's in front of them every day and make it come alive in some way in the real world. That's what the magnet program does."

Let's Lead at Saskatoon Public Schools

2013 Premier's Board of Education Award for Innovation and Excellence submission

Developing leadership skills at an early age is important, and when it comes to our at-risk youth, developing good leadership skills can be crucial to future success.

Two innovative teachers in Saskatoon Public Schools (SPS), Chris Clark and Gillian Strange, believed that giving at risk students the opportunity and encouragement to develop leadership and teamwork skills would enrich their lives and help them to fully develop and reach their true potential.

"Let's Lead Nīkānētān was the vision of Clark and Strange who knew what this kind of program could do for some of their students," said Bruce Bradshaw, Superintendent of Education for SPS. "They were both encouraged to pursue this to see what it might look like and the program evolved from there."

Clark and Strange knew that not all students thrive in a typical school atmosphere, and for those who don't, it is important to recognize this and offer alternatives.

Let's Lead Nīkānētān offers just such an alternative. It is a unique and innovative experiential program offered to all SPS students in Grade 8. Once a year, 50 students can apply to the program. Those 50 are then invited to a special two day,

one-night camp. At the end of that camp the number is pared down to the final 28 who are accepted into the program.

Clark, Strange, and one educational assistant provide the supports for this program which was officially launched in 2007 at Westmount Community School in Saskatoon.

"Donations assisted the launch of the program but now the funding for this program is provided almost completely by the board's operating budget," said Bradshaw. "The board sees the need for the program, which is evidenced by the number of applications this program receives each year."

The difference between this program and many others is that it is offered at no-cost to the participants. It is the only program in which no fees are charged.

"All fees — from supplies to transportation — are covered by the board," explains Bradshaw.

The financial costs may be high for the program but the rewards are equally great. The students are given the opportunity to develop independence, leadership and teamwork skills. The result is teachers and students working together, creating a special bond of trust and friendship that extends beyond the confines of a classroom.

"For example, try working to bring together a three or four night camping trip. All 31 out there — teachers and students — each with a job to do to bring the event together," said Bradshaw. "Now add in potential obstacles such as weather and transportation that can wreak havoc on the best of events. These students learn to pull together as a team to make things happen. They grow, they develop, they thrive."

"Let's Lead — $N\bar{\imath}k\bar{a}n\bar{e}t\bar{a}n$ is a truly remarkable program for

developing leadership skills amongst elementary students. We know if given the right conditions for learning — in this case, through hands-on experience in a close-knit group — we can foster students' passion for exploration and personal development," said Morrison. "The connections that develop between the students and the teachers help build confidence and allow students to reach their potential. Our school board is proud to support this program, which has had a positive impact on every student who has taken part in it through the years."
