# **Premier Thanks School Board Trustees for Efforts in Education**

Following his address to the Saskatchewan School Boards Association (SSBA) Annual General Meeting in November, Premier Brad Wall told reporters that his message was "really a thank you" to school board trustees for their efforts.

"We have in the trustees a group of women and men who are in elected office. There's really no pay that comes with it, there's not a lot of fame that comes with it. They're doing this because of their dedication to students across the province and the education system, so first and foremost, we should say thank you to them," Wall said.

The premier said he also wanted to highlight investments made by his government since taking office in expanding operational budgets for education and increasing capital investments in school infrastructure.

"I also wanted to indicate we know there's work to be done. We know some school divisions are still under significant growth pressures in terms of enrolment increases. We want to work with them on a new funding formula that will help address some of these challenges of

growth, "Wall told reporters, noting such challenges are preferred in comparison to having to close schools because of a lack of growth.

"The trustees, the school divisions, are facing them on a frontline basis," he said of the issues. "We know they need a meaningful partner in government to help deal with them."

Wall also commented on the importance of First Nations education, noting that "even in tight

budgets, we want to find the resources so we can continue" to improve outcomes and close gaps for First Nations students.

While acknowledging budget limitations and tough decisions across government, Wall also pointed to the work of the education funding formula review as important in balancing needs related to student growth in some areas and distance considerations faced by rural school divisions in others.

## President's Address Highlights Strong Foundation, Bold Future

SSBA President Connie Bailey discussed the history of trusteeship, the work of the Association and the outlook for the future during her address to the membership on the opening night of the organization's 100th anniversary convention.

Bailey opened her address with a welcome to the Association's 2015 Fall General Assembly and Annual General Meeting.

She noted 2015 has also been proclaimed "Year of the Trustee" and said the Association is thrilled to be recognizing its centennial year during the convention.

The theme of the convention was Strong Foundation, Bold Future, which Bailey said she thought was very fitting. She thanked the Board Development Committee for developing the theme and for all of its work.

Bailey briefly discussed the history of trusteeship in the province of Saskatchewan.

"When our country was formed, it was recognized that the best decisions on education needed to be closest to the community, authority for education was given to each province and in turn local boards

were established," she said.

"Local autonomy and governance have been foundations of education ever since – and even before – Saskatchewan officially became a province," Bailey continued. "Locally elected school boards have a vital role in serving Saskatchewan's publicly-funded education system."

She went on to discuss the ongoing responsibility of board members to bring the voice of the public to publicly funded education by representing local communities.

"In my time of service, I have consistently seen boards of education in this province have to make tough decisions, navigate change and unpredictability and show courageous leadership by representing local interests even when it is not the most popular thing to do," Bailey said.

"We should be truly proud of how boards, individual trustees and staff operate with personal integrity, how we take pride and responsibility for our work and decisions," she continued, noting that boards are working together more than ever before within a culture of trust and mutual respect.

Bailey said she is proud of the passion, commitment and effort demonstrated by trustees. She noted that lots has changed during the Association's 100 year history and that change will continue.

"We must be bold in looking ahead and planning for the future, for this organization and its members, and for the education system as a whole," she remarked. "We on the Provincial Executive continue to refine and enhance our strategic focus."

Bailey discussed the SSBA's mandate of advocacy, services and board development.

On advocacy, the Provincial Executive continues to work hard to refine and enhance its effectiveness in speaking on behalf of members, she said, thanking boards for their support and noting that the SSBA will continue to advocate for the interests of boards.

"Your Executive continues to advocate for the autonomy of boards to make the decisions they know are in the best interests of their students and communities — while finding the best ways to come together for the benefit of all Saskatchewan students," she said.

In terms of services, Bailey said the SSBA continues to hear that services such as legal, insurance and risk management and employee benefits are valued by members. The organization will continue to listen and make improvements to ensure services meet the needs of the members, she added.

"Providing and improving the

services continues to represent an important part of our efforts," the president noted.

Regarding board development, Bailey pointed to the many opportunities for growth and education made available to members each year through the SSBA. She observed that there is great value in gathering to discuss, learn and understand, but also said the Association is always working to improve and be efficient.

"We are strong when we work together and we will continue to provide opportunities to our members to enhance and facilitate efforts in our sector to work with each other and our many partners," Bailey said.

"Going forward – into our 'bold future' – this will be an exciting and challenging year," Bailey said.

She said there remains lots of work involved in order to meet the bold targets set out in both the Education Sector Strategic Plan for the province and the SSBA Vision 2025 Strategic Plan.

Also on the horizon are a provincial election in the spring of 2016, uncertainty around the timing of the next provincial budget and board of education elections in the fall of 2016.

Bailey said the organization's needs include ensuring that, as an Association representing all 28 boards of education throughout the province, its voice is strong, its voice is heard and that education remains a priority.

"The work of the SSBA and its member boards remains deeply rooted in the belief that every child in Saskatchewan, regardless of where they live or their personal circumstances, must have the resources and supports they need to achieve and succeed," the president said in finishing her address.

"Thank you all for your continued efforts in support of education in our province. I look forward to a productive couple of days working with you as we celebrate our strong foundation and focus our efforts on our bold future," she concluded.

### Premier's Board of Education Award for Innovation and Excellence

Prairie South Schools received the 2015 Premier's Board of Education Award for Innovation and Excellence in Education for its Pathways to Success Practical and Applied Arts Enhancement Project.

The Saskatchewan School Boards Association coordinates the Premier's Award each year. The award was presented by Premier Brad Wall during the SSBA 100th Anniversary Annual General Assembly on Nov. 9 in Saskatoon.

"Our students are the future of this province and it's important that each of them has the opportunity to reach their full potential in our classrooms, regardless of where they live," said Premier Brad Wall. "I applaud Prairie South's dedication to its students and the division's willingness to explore new ways to deliver courses that help prepare students for meaningful careers.

"It's my honour to present them with the 2015 Premier's Board of Education Award for Innovation and Excellence," Wall added.

Prior to Prairie South's Pathways to Success: Practical and Applied Arts Enhancement Project, not all high school students in the division had equitable access to the same practical and applied arts credit options. Now, through a variety of delivery options, flexible learning programs, centralized equipment purchasing and innovative partnerships, all Prairie South students have the opportunity, regardless of geographical location and the size of their schools, to access a wider variety of options.

"As a board, we have enjoyed seeing our students participate in a wider range of activities than was previously possible" said Dr. Shawn Davidson, Board Chair at Prairie

South Schools. "The willingness of our business, industry and community partners to roll up their sleeves and build programs together with our staff has created opportunities that I wouldn't have dreamed of when I was in school. We are excited to be preparing students for careers and life in the 21st century."

The \$3,000 award is sponsored by Xerox Canada. The award recipient is recommended by a panel that includes representation from the Faculty of Education at the University of Regina, the College of Education at the University of Saskatchewan, the Ministry of Education, the Saskatchewan Teachers' Federation and the League of Educational Administrators, Directors and Superintendents of Saskatchewan.





# Two Saskatchewan Aboriginal Youth Entrepreneurship Students Awarded

On behalf of the Provincial Executive, SSBA Central Constituency Representative Larry Pavloff helped celebrate the accomplishments of two Aboriginal Youth Entrepreneurship Program students at an event in November.

Students who participate in the AYEP are offered an opportunity to apply to access funding to start their own micro-businesses. This year, two students from Saskatchewan were awarded as recipients of \$500 business start-up grants. This is the first time since the AYEP has been offered in Saskatchewan for grants to be received here.

The two students who received the grants, Heather Keskotagan and Tia Wahobin, both graduated from Sakewew High School in June.

Keskotagan is from the Red Pheasant First Nation. Her business plan was to create Aboriginal logos and custom printed T-shirts. Today she works at Caleb Manor and operates her small T-shirt and decal business. Her future plans are to enroll in a business course.

Wahobin is a member of the Mosquito First Nation. Her business idea was to be a marketing agent for local First Nations artisans. She is enrolled full-time in university, working part-time and raising a son.

Both are planning on going back to Sakewew High School to share their experiences regarding their business ideas with other students.

Pavloff presented the recipients with their grants during an event at the school on Nov. 26. He thanked the AYEP's sponsors and said the SSBA is proud to support the delivery of the Martin Aboriginal Education Initiative's program.

#### SUN WEST SCHOOL DIVISION RECEIVES AWARD FOR BLENDED LEARNING INITIATIVE

The Canadian Education Association and Reader's Digest Canada have recognized three award-winning school districts for leading lasting and system-changing K-12 initiatives.

Cash prizes of \$25,000, \$10,000 and \$5,000 were presented to winning school districts to continue to support and grow their innovative programs and initiatives.

Saskatchewan's Sun West School Division was awarded Second Prize of \$10,000 for a district-wide blended learning system.
