
- "Ignoring Indigenous culture leads to classroom disconnect"

### Call to Action 10:

"....to draft new Aboriginal education legislation..... full participation and informed consent of Aboriginal Peoples........ include a commitment to sufficient funding and would incorporate the following principals..."

- ii. Improving education attainment levels and success rates.
- iii. Developing culturally appropriate curricula.
- iv. Protecting the right to Aboriginal languages, including the teaching of Aboriginal languages as credit courses.
- vii. Respecting and honouring Treaty relationships.





### Call to Action 62:

"....in consultation and collaboration with Survivors, Aboriginal Peoples and educators to:

i. Make age-appropriate curriculum on residential schools, Treaties and Aboriginal Peoples' historical and contemporary contributions to Canada, a mandatory education requirement for K to 12 students.

iv. Establish senior-level positions in government at the assistant deputy minister level or higher, dedicated to Aboriginal content in education.





### Call to Action 63:

- "....to maintain an annual commitment to Aboriginal education issues, including:
- i. Developing and implementing K-12 curriculum and learning resources on Aboriginal Peoples' history, and the history and legacy of Residential Schools.
- ii. Sharing information and best practices on teaching curriculum related to residential schools and Aboriginal history.
- iii. Building student capacity for intercultural understanding, empathy and mutual respect.
- iv. Identifying teacher training needs related to the above.

#### Structure

We propose that all undergraduate students at the University of Winnipeg be required to take 3 credit hours from a list of approved courses. Graduate, PACE, and ELP students would not be subject to this requirement.

The UWSA and the ASC have convened faculty, student, elder, and staff representatives to form the Indigenous Requirement Curriculum Advisory Committee. This committee will provide authoritative guidance on the finalized list of qualifying courses submitted to Senate for approval.

The Indigenous Requirement Curriculum Advisory Committee met in early December, producing guidelines for course inclusion within the Indigenous Requirement. A course will be eligible to satisfy the Requirement if:

- a) It focuses on Indigenous content, including history, culture, ways of knowing and lived experience;
- It fosters an environment of knowledge and experience exchange between Indigenous students, faculty, community members, and the larger University community.

Courses eligible for fulfilling the Indigenous Requirement will be considered using the following criteria:

- a) Topics;
- b) Readings;
- c) Assignments;
- d) Guest lectures;
- e) Instructor:
- f) Students;
- g) Experiential components;
- h) Locations.

These criteria are not weighted, but will be considered by the Indigenous Requirement Curriculum Advisory Committee holistically, along with any justifications provided by a department.




### 100 Years of Loss Exhibit











### Residential Schools Resource

The Residential School System in Canada









