


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

Economic Model

- Provincial Input-Output Model
 - Common macroeconomic analysis
 - Interdependencies between different economic sectors or industries
 - Estimates positive and negative economic shocks & analyzes the ripple effects
- Saskatchewan Core Model
 - Rectangular model with 35 industries & 66 commodities
 (aggregated to 25 industries in detailed impacts Tables 8 and 9 in report)
- Praxis Satellite Modules
 - Fiscal, Population & Regional
 - Fiscal used in this analysis

- 2020-2021 fiscal year

2. Statistics Canada

- 2016 Census (latest available)
- # of high school graduates
- Destination of graduates after high school (eg. labour market, post-secondary)

3. SaskJobs Ads

- Estimated employment of high school graduates by industry
- 326 of 11,978 postings for those without training beyond grade 12 (on July 26th)



Benefits of K-12 Education

High School Graduates vs. Non-Graduates


- Graduates earn +\$150,000 to \$415,000 (\$CAD) lifetime over high school non-graduates
- Lower incarceration rates from 3.4% to 10% compared with high school non-graduates
- In the USA, graduates aged 20-64 received \$23,400 in gov't medical assistance compared to \$60,800 for non-grads

Definition of Economic Impacts



Direct Impact:

Total initial expenditure of school divisions operations.

For example: Teachers' salaries

Indirect Impact:

Secondary impacts include interindustry transactions such as purchases of inputs from supporting industries.

For example: A local business restocking after a large order of stationery from school divisions.

Induced Impact:

These are the additional impacts from changes in household spending as additional labor is hired or reduced, caused by ripples in the economy.

For example: Purchases of stationery from a local business cause the business to increase staff.

Definitions - Continued


Gross Output – measures total expenditures on local goods and services as well as business profits and payments to labour

Gross Domestic Product – measures net economic activity within a prescribed geographic area (ie. Saskatchewan). Excludes intermediate goods and services used in production.

Employment – measured in FTEs (for direct school division operations) and positions (for graduate productivity)


Labour Income – includes wages, salaries, and employer contributions to pensions and benefits

Graduate Productivity Impact - Provincial



Summary

The impact of school division operations and graduate productivity (2020-2021) is:

- **\$8.3 billion** in gross economic activity
- \$5.5 billion in gross domestic product
- **\$3.1 billion** in labour income (included in GDP)
- \$556 million in provincial government revenues
- 51,754 jobs created
- 1 in 11 jobs in Saskatchewan depend directly or indirectly on school divisions
